Didactic Program in Dietetics Verification Statement

How does someone become a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN)?

There are three academic options that lead to the RDN credential. At Mississippi State University, students may complete a Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD) and/or Dietetic Internship. Both an accredited DPD and DI program are available through the Department of Food Science, Nutrition and Health Promotion.

What is a DPD verification statement?

This is a signed document an individual receives after completing the requirements of a nutrition and dietetics education program accredited by the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics (ACEND).

When the DPD director signs a verification statement, they are verifying that the individual has completed at least a baccalaureate degree from a U.S. regionally-accredited college/university or foreign equivalent and met the above stated requirements. This document establishes eligibility for a Dietetic Internship or other Supervised Practice program which requires the DPD verification statement as a prerequisite.

What is needed for an undergraduate student to receive a verification statement from the MSU DPD?

- Completion of a bachelor's degree in Food Science Nutrition and Health Promotion with a concentration in Food and Nutrition.
- Grade of "C" or higher in all required DPD courses.
- Minimum of a 3.0 MSU GPA.
- DPD Eligibility Form

What if an individual already has a bachelor's degree from a different major or university?

If a person already holds a bachelor's degree, they must complete the DPD courses with a grade of "C" or higher and maintain a 3.0 GPA before they receive a verification statement. (See DPD course list.)

Can a person who already has a bachelor's degree complete the DPD requirements while working on a graduate degree?

Yes. Many DPD courses are offered at the undergraduate and graduate level. DPD course credit offered at the graduate level can count towards both dietetics core knowledge and master's degree requirements. Students who wish to complete DPD courses while enrolled in a graduate program will need to communicate with their graduate advisor and the DPD director to ensure their plan of study incorporates all requirements.
